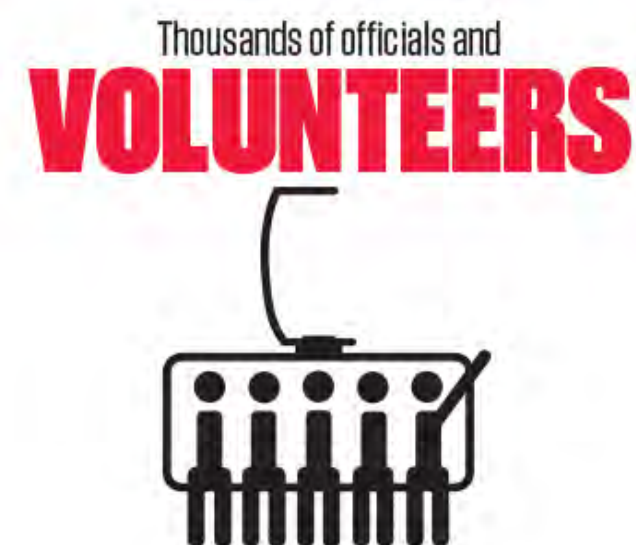

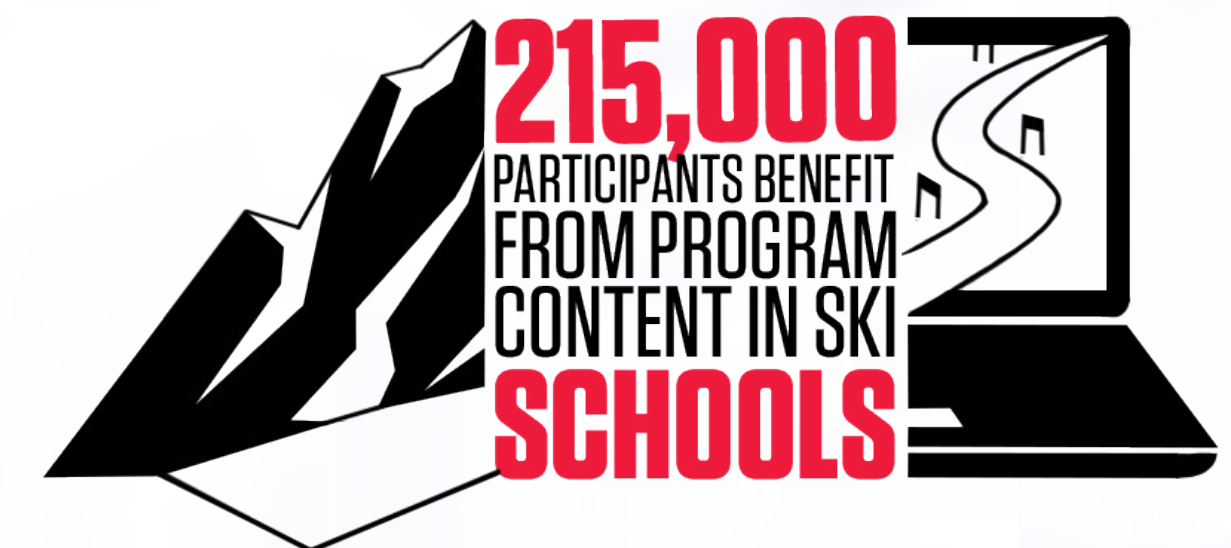


WHO IS

MESSAGE FROM CHAIR & CEO

The 2021-22 season was a breakout year for Canada's National Ski Team with 40 World Cup podiums, 150 top 10s and an amazing Olympic Winter Games with two Olympic and six Paralympic medals. Highlights of the Games included Jack Crawford's bronze medal, Canada's first Olympic alpine podium in eight years, and Mollie Jespen leading Team Canada into the stadium at the closing ceremony of the Paralympic Winter Games. Our athletes, teams and coaches demonstrated remarkable creativity, agility, and resilience to prepare for and execute at a COVID Games in Beijing.

Another highlight of the season was the performance of our Alpine World Junior team in Panorama, BC with 11 Top 10s and a gold medal in the mixed team event beating Germany, Italy, USA and Austria. These results come from the initial roll-out of the Alpine Excel Program which is critical to making the shifts needed to elevate the system. All three high-performance programs have been focused on building out robust Podium Pathways (PP) and Gold Medal Profiles (GMP) to enable evidence base talent ID, progression of athletes along the pathway, and alignment with PTSOs on what "needs to be true" to progress athletes toward the podium.

On the domestic front, training, racing and registration have mostly recovered back to 2019-20 levels. Coach certification has accelerated with the return of the ability to conduct practical on-hill evaluation. We also hosted a full calendar of Nor-Am races and National Championships that allowed for the execution of a fitness and technical skills combine for the first time ever at the U16 Nationals. We built a permanent ski cross training center at Nakiska that is serving our ski cross national team and club athletes well, where we also executed a successful Ski Cross World Cup and last chance Olympic qualifier.

We have been unwavering in our commitment to create a healthy, safe, and inclusive sport experience for all participants and continue to make it a priority. It is the foundation for a culture of excellence where every athlete, coach and team staff member can be at their very best. We have been monitoring the current National Sport culture and safety landscape closely and have been proactive in fostering best in class culture, safety, and risk management with the oversight of the HR & EDI committee. We are executing against our Safe Sport strategy, which is grounded in the policies (Conduct Policy suite, EDI etc), education, and action plans initiated last year. Our expanded support of PTSOs in policy development, education, and complaint/case management was a service much appreciated by PTSOs this past year. We are supporting our athletes in strengthening the Athletes' Council to ensure the athlete voice and input is heard on matters of importance to athletes. Finally, we are preparing to implement the mandatory National Independent Mechanism once it is ready.

We closed FY 2022 in a strong financial position the result of a healthy year from a financial perspective, leveraging one time Sport Recovery Funding and Board donations, and generating +\$1.1mm in new partnerships revenue to sustain our programming and begin to build an operating reserve. The funding was allocated to 1) Alpine Excel program elements we could initiate this year (U16 Nationals & talent ID camps, U21 WJC training camps & competition, equipment purchases and software licensing; coach support); 2) Staff support in the Domestic Sport & Partnerships/Marketing departments; 3) SnowReg national registration database expansion and 4) incremental SX WC costs due to COVID. While we have much work ahead to carve a better future for ski racing in Canada, we are proud, but not satisfied with the progress made. It would not have been possible without all our stakeholders and the ski racing community across Canada, thank you!

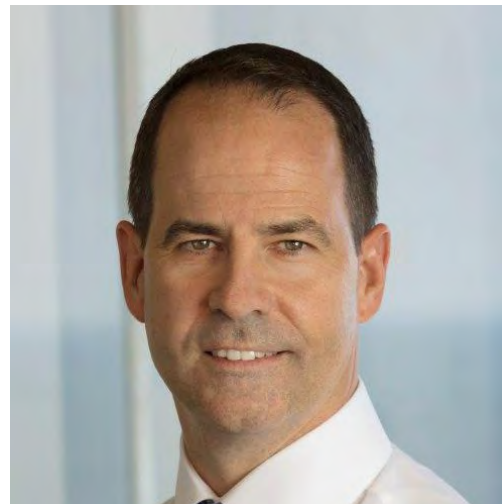

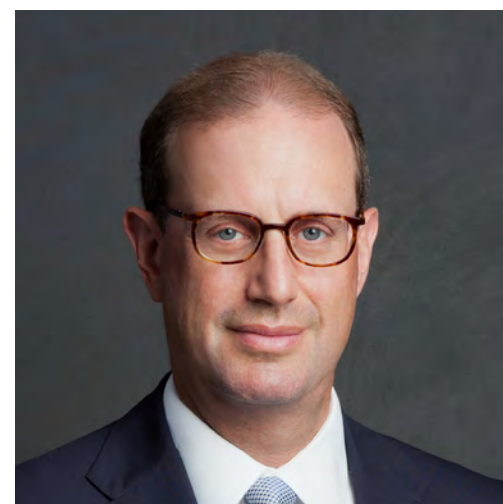

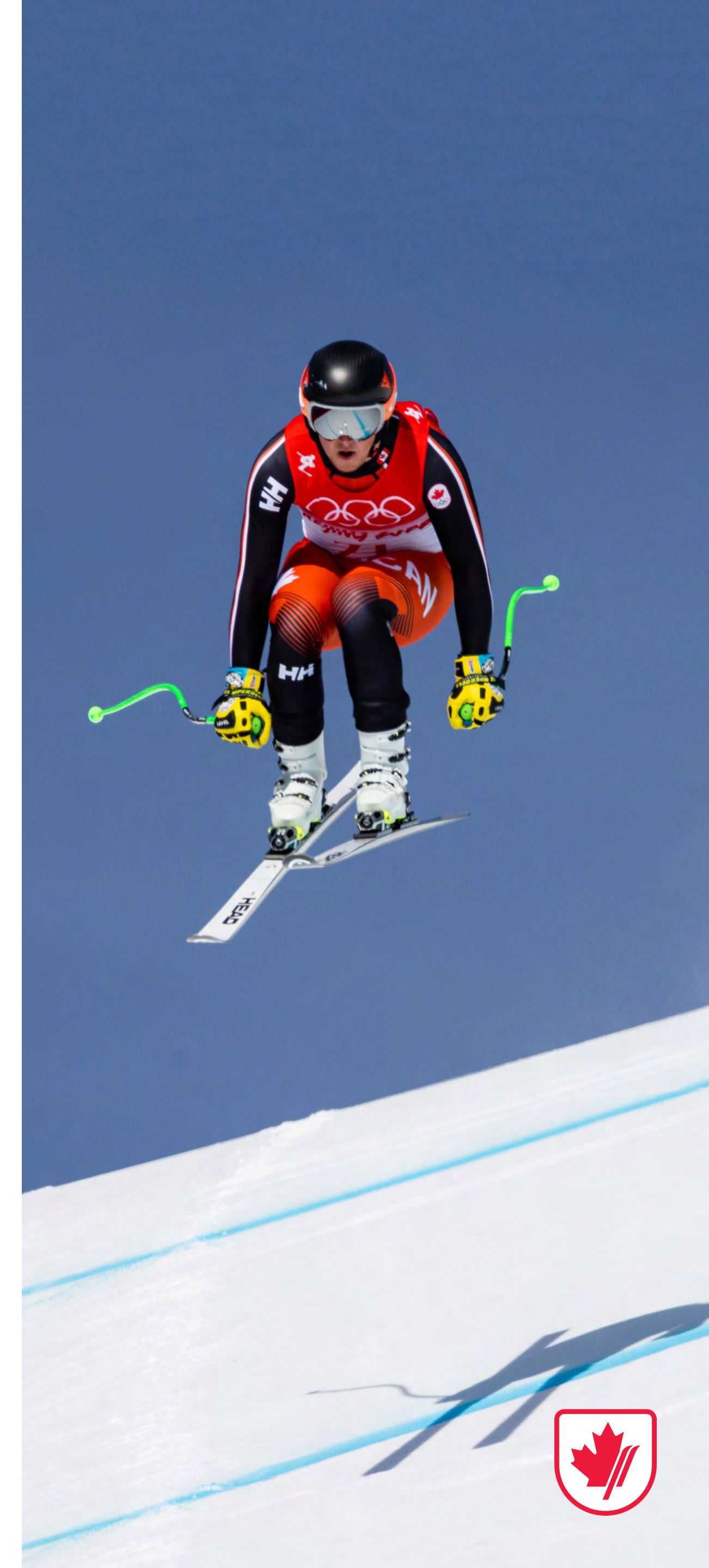

TRANSITION TO OFFICE OF THE SPORT INTEGRITY

COMMISSIONER

Alpine Canada is committed to and strongly supports the need for an independent safe sport entity through the SDRCC and the establishment of Office of the Sport Integrity Commissioner (OSIC) to ensure our athletes, participants and members can compete and participate in sport free from abuse, harassment and maltreat of all kinds.



Together with 55 National Sport Organizations (NSO's) and Multi-Sport Organizations (MSO's), we have been working with the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada (SDRCC) to finalize a core service agreement.

Alpine Canada will transition to OSIC by December 31st 2022.
